Practice Case: Noah

Noah completed the MMPI-A as part of a comprehensive assessment conducted in an outpatient setting. He was referred by his biological parents, who sought to understand inappropriate sexual behaviors that resulted in Noah being adjudicated delinquent. Both the MMPI-A and the MMPI-A-RF score reports were derived from this same test administration.

Noah is a 14-year-old White boy. He lives with his biological parents and two younger brothers, all of whom Noah described having "super great" relationships with. Noah had no history of medical or mental health difficulties, though both Noah and his mother described Noah as having always been nervous and anxious. Noah thought his experience of anxiety in the past year had been substantially worse. He believed the increased anxiety began after he and his brothers were sexually abused by an uncle who lived with his family for several months. Noah said he had a hard time not thinking about what his uncle had done. He reported feeling guilty for not protecting his brothers and for not telling his parents what was happening sooner. He described also feeling worried and afraid, which he thought was "stupid" because his uncle was in jail and could no longer hurt them. Noah thought these experiences may have also affected his friendships, as he was sure his friends all knew he was "messed up." He described avoiding his friends due to this belief, as well as having little interest in engaging in social activities he used to enjoy.

At the time of the evaluation, Noah was in the 8<sup>th</sup> grade and had no problems with academic achievement or behavioral difficulties. However, Noah had been adjudicated delinquent in the past year for disorderly conduct. Records indicate Noah exposed his private parts to a group of friends at a local park. This act was witnessed by several young children and their parents, who called the police. During the evaluation, Noah also reported having used his

father's computer password to access pornography, having texted pictures of his private parts to a friend, and having stolen lingerie from the bedroom of his friend's mother. Noah reported having used alcohol and marijuana in the past but denied any regular use of these or other substances.

Noah appeared shy and was reticent to talk about his experience of sexual abuse during the evaluation. He was cooperative with psychological testing, and he completed the MMPI with no observed difficulties.

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








