



## CHAPTER 10

# Bureaucracies, Policymaking, and Governance

This chapter discusses the role of the bureaucracy in the modern state, with a particular emphasis on the British Civil Service. Bureaucratic structures can provide considerable social and political benefits, as evident in the Indian Civil Service. They can also allow for considerable economic growth, provided they have enough embedded autonomy to do so. The chapter then introduces a number of theoretical approaches to decision making drawn from Allison and literature on New Public Management. The recent trend of “agenification” in the UK is discussed, along with the concepts of governance and “good governance.” The chapter concludes with a summary of the related concepts of policy communities, “iron triangles,” and issue networks.
